Atlas

An atlas under the general title "Hotspots of inequality – Emergency Department Presentations" have been created from the 2017/18 to 2019/20 Emergency Department data. The atlas presents the geographical distribution of Emergency Department (ED) presentations for a range of presentation types.

The atlas presents the range of geographic and temporal variations in the selected categories compared to the Australian average rate. Based on the data, a temperature is allocated to an area to visualise the persistence and magnitude of the rates of presentation within an area. Where rates are persistently high over time, these areas are classified as "Hot" in relation to the Australian average. Alternatively, where rates are lower over time, in comparison to the Australian average, the area is classified as "Cold". We also provide a range of temperature values between these two extremes.

Atlas example - initial screen




Figure 1 Initial web page of the hotspots of inequality--Emergency Department Presentations.

Figure 1 shows the initial web page when the link to the atlas is clicked. The middle window panel shows a map of the Australian continent divided up by Population Health Areas (PHA), the geography used by PHIDU. Areas highlighted as "Hot" are shown on the map as a dark green colour. You can click the PHAs off and on by clicking on the toggle box in the right panel labeled "Population Health Areas".

Other geographic areas (Local Government Areas, Primary Health Networks) are provided for reference purposes and can be accessed by scrolling down the window panel.

The left window panel has a list of the categories of ED presentation types that can be investigated. By default, the selected scenario is Total presentations – persons – Cold to Hot Range >> Threshold set to the Australian average. This is shown in the top label of the middle window panel. If this is not the case, you can click on the "Select Data" tab to resent the left panel to the show the list of categories. When you select a category, the selection name will appear in the title label above the map. The right window panel shows the legend which has five heat classifications; Hot, Warm-Hot,

Warm, Cold-Warm and Cold. A Not Applicable (NA) category is also included. This category highlights PHAs which have been confidentialised because of small populations, have less than five reported presentations over the three years of analysis or do not have three years of data.

The bottom middle window panel provides a bar graph of the distribution of data for the five classifications and NA classification. For the current selected category and threshold, nearly 40% of the PHAs are identified as "Hot" meaning that these PHAs have been classified as having rates higher than the Australian average threshold for the majority of years under investigation. Alternatively, around half the PHAs are identified as "Cold" meaning that these PHAs have been classified as having rates lower than the Australian average threshold for the majority of years under investigation.

Atlas example – zooming in/out and data selection




Figure 2 Zoom buttons and the range of 20 threshold selections under a chosen ED category via clicking the arrow.

By clicking on the category, in this case the Total presentations – persons, and the arrow you can expand the category to show a list of the 20 thresholds. Clicking on a threshold selects the scenario. Here, Total presentations – persons – Cold to Hot Range >> Threshold set to the Australian Average has been chosen (Figure 2). You can zoom in via your mouse wheel or by placing your mouse pointer on the map in the middle window panel and then clicking on the zoom buttons which will pop up in the left corner of the panel. Alternatively, you can click on the "Filter to an area" drop down menu and select an option to zoom to specific areas.

Atlas example -data visualisation




Figure 3 Change to the left and middle panels when a threshold has been chosen –Total presentations– persons – Cold to Hot Range >> Threshold set to 10% more than the Australian Average.

When making this selection, the left hand window panel now changes to reflect the data for the selected threshold (Figure 3). The first column is the dot column, this represents the heat of the PHA in tabular form. For example, for the first instance is the NSW: Gosford-South East PHA show in the Name column. The dot is white representing the "Cold" category which is also reported in the Category column. Another instance is the NSW: Gosford – Springfield/Wyoming PHA which has a dark green dot colour representing the "Hot" category. The Number column represents the total number of ED presentations over the three years for this specific category regardless of the

threshold chosen. Placing the mouse over an instance in the Name column highlights the PHA on the map in the middle window panel and clicking on the instance zooms to that selected PHA.




Figure 4 Selecting specific PHAs through the data table for the Gosford area.

We have made two selections within this threshold, and the map in the middle window panel now shows the geographic variation in the heat of Total presentations – persons category around the region of Gosford (Figure 4). This geographic variability in heat can be explored further by zooming in and out of the panel. Choosing a new threshold also changes the bar graph in the bottom middle window panel. To go back to the list of ED presentation categories click on the "Select data" tab.

Heat Map Graphs by PHA

To summarise the large amount of information available within and across the range of ED presentations types and thresholds at the PHA geography, we provide a heat map graph for each




Figure 5 Heat map graphs for the Gosford – South East and Gosford – Springfield/Wyoming PHAs.

PHA. These can be investigated by clicking on the file graphic which is to the immediate right of the dot column (Figure 4). We provide two examples of a heat map graph (Figure 5). The first is for the NSW: Gosford-South East PHA classified as "Cold" and the second the NSW: Gosford – Springfield/Wyoming PHA classified as "Hot" for the Total persentations – persons category (Figure 4). The heat maps for these areas are shown in Figure 5.

Within each PHA and ED presentation types, the heat of a PHA, starts off in these examples as "Hot", as all categories have greater rates of presentations when compared to the lowest threshold; the 50% less than the Australian average rate (Aust. Avg.) threshold (half the Australian rate). As the thresholds are increased, the heat of the Total presentations – persons category either persists as "Hot" or becomes cooler.

For example, for the Total persentations – persons category, the heat the Gosford – South East PHA becomes "Cold" at the 10% less than the Australian Average threshold. While some other ED presentations types reported "Warm-Hot" and "Warm" classifications for other thresholds. In comparison, several ED presentations types were classified as "Hot" over the Australian average for the Gosford – Springfield/Wyoming PHA. Presentations for mental and behavioral disorders for patoients aged 35 to 44 years old (Mental – Aged 35 – 44) was classified as "Hot" when the threshold reached 60% more than the Australian Average.
